In western Pennsylvania, alongside traditional sports like football, basketball, baseball, and wrestling, bocce is emerging as a popular option. The region has seen a rise in Unified Bocce, where players with special needs join peers to form teams, fostering inclusivity. The program, part of Special Olympics, has gained traction, with 66 schools in the western region participating in Unified Indoor Bocce leagues. Stephanie Taylor from Special Olympics notes the sport's growth, highlighting its sanctioning by the PIAA. Washington School District exemplifies inclusive practices, with its Unified Bocce team led by Coach Ron Todd, a Special Education teacher. Todd emphasizes the team's role in building confidence and self-esteem while providing a fun learning experience.



Camilla Justice, Washington's Director of Special Education, expresses delight at the enthusiastic embrace of the game by the teenagers. "We have an exceptional cohort of students ranging from freshmen to seniors, collaborating effectively within the team. They enjoy engaging practices, acquiring diverse strategies for success, and relish the opportunity to compete against other schools' teams," Justice remarks. She emphasizes that the team's objectives align perfectly with the mission outlined on the Unified Sports website: "to foster inclusivity through shared sports training and competitive experiences, guided by the fundamental principle of training and playing together. This approach provides meaningful opportunities for both students with and without disabilities to participate as equals in sports."
